PANDEMIC SHINES LIGHT ON VITAL ROLE OF RESPIRATORY THERAPISTS



If there is one thing that respiratory therapists agree on, it's the fact that many people don't know they exist. While the current COVID-19 pandemic has shone a light on the very important work they do in intensive care units, at West Park, respiratory therapists have a vital role, providing care for all patients with health conditions that affect lung function.

They work with patients who are ventilator dependent and respiratory rehabilitation patients with chronic breathing disorders. They provide education and support for people who are transitioning from in-patient care to living at home. And on evenings and weekends, respiratory therapists, who are also trained in advanced cardiac life support, lead all rapid responses and code blues, in coordination with the doctor on call.

The Long-Term Ventilation Service is where West Park's respiratory therapists spend most of their time, working with patients who are invasively ventilated, requiring mechanical assistance to breathe. These patients call West Park home, and are some of the hospital's most vulnerable.

We spoke with three respiratory therapists, who shared their perspective of working on the front-line during the pandemic.

- "We did have some suspected COVID-19 patients here in March that interacted with a patient who had tested positive for the virus. So the respiratory therapy team, along with the doctors and other care staff had to decide 'how are we going to protect these patients and how are we going to protect the staff?'"

- "At the first sign of any change in a patient's status, such as a low fever or a dry cough, they are put into isolation and tested for the virus right away. We have to be very careful."

- "We take breathing for granted. We don't think that there will be a point where we can't breathe. We try our best to optimize a patient's ventilation so that they don't feel that breathing is a challenge."

WEST PARK'S IMPORTANT ROLE DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

In West Park's Long-Term Ventilation (LTV) Service, many of the patients call the hospital home. An interprofessional team provides 24-hour care and support for these patients who are invasively ventilated, requiring mechanical assistance to help them breathe.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the LTV Service has expanded to add 23 more beds – an increase in capacity of more than 60 per cent. This is in support of the Toronto Region's pandemic response, in particular, the effort to increase capacity in acute care hospital's Intensive Care Units (ICU).

"We play a key role in helping ICUs transfer their medically stable chronically ventilated patients out of the ICU service, when these patients no longer need that level of care," says Raj Kohli, the Clinical Practice Leader for Respiratory Therapy and the Clinical Coordinator of the Long-Term Ventilation Strategy at West Park. "Our role is critical in moving these patients to more appropriate settings and allowing the ICUs to free up beds and ventilators for the patients who require that level of care."

West Park's role is especially important during the COVID-19 pandemic, helping to ensure that the healthcare system isn't overwhelmed and that people who have become critically ill with the virus can be admitted to ICUs. West Park, as the Centre of Excellence for Long-Term Ventilation, is leading the coordination process to transfer these patients, and has accepted patients from North York General, Humber River and Trillium Health Partners.

"These transfers can really enrich a patient's life," says Angela Dowd, West Park's LTV Service Manager. "An ICU environment is very different from the environment we provide here at West Park. It's about ensuring the right patient is in the right bed receiving the appropriate level of care at the right time."

The LTV Strategy was established in 2006 after a SARS review discovered that one of the biggest barriers during the epidemic, as people were getting sick and needing intensive care, was that many ICU beds were being occupied by medically stable chronically ventilated patients.

"Before SARS, there was never a strategy or system in place to consistently transfer patients who no longer needed the ICU but remained because they were invasively ventilated," says Kohli, who worked at West Park during the SARS epidemic in 2003, when the hospital had opened Ontario's first dedicated SARS Unit.

It has been an extremely busy time for West Park's frontline healthcare workers as they navigate the uncertainty of the current pandemic along with the increase of LTV patients.

"Our processes for keeping patients safe hasn't changed because that is always our number one priority, but the timeframe and responsiveness of the team, including ensuring that everything is in place for the patient, is quicker," says Dowd. "The staff has been absolutely amazing. Everyone is working their absolute hardest, going above and beyond to make sure we are providing not only excellent care and responding to health system needs, but also ensuring that we are addressing the human aspect of care."

"Staff are also realizing the important role that West Park has in this process because if we can't get the patients out of the ICU, then a patient who is critically ill may not have access to a bed," adds Kohli. "It's challenging, but the role we're playing in the grand scheme of things is an essential one."

CELEBRATING THE RT OF THRFF -Rous families



On March 5th, West Park celebrated the support of three families that have made significant contributions to the Foundation's Get Your Life Back Campaign.

Patients, staff and other members of the West Park community gathered in the hospital's Enbridge Auditorium to thank the Wilson, Weishuhn, and Troop families for their generous gifts, which will have a big impact on our new hospital.

"These generous gifts will make our new hospital a better place by enhancing the care experience for patients and their families," says Joanne Cole, West Park Foundation CEO. "We are grateful for their support, which will make a difference in the lives of our patients for decades to come."

Gordon Wilson, a member of West Park's Board of Directors from 1989 to 1994, and a long-time patient of the Day Hospital, donated \$250,000 to create the Audrey Wilson Therapy Trail, in memory of his wife of more than 60 years. The trail will benefit future patients and their families by connecting them with the healing benefits of nature. Gordon and Audrey shared a love of hiking in the great outdoors, and in a few short years, this trail will help West Park integrate nature into rehabilitative care.

The hospital's auditorium is often described as its family room. It hosts special events, like patient Pub Nights and Coffee Houses, as well as presentations and gatherings for staff. David Weishuhn, a former West Park patient and Foundation Board member, and his family have made a generous gift of \$250,000 to fund the Weishuhn Auditorium. The Auditorium will be a feature element in the new hospital, giving our community a central meeting place.

lan Troop, Chair of the Get Your Life Back Campaign, and his father Fred have made a \$100,000 family gift to fund the Frederick and Isabella Troop Family Dining Room and the Frederick and Isabella Troop Family Activity Room in the MSK Rehabilitation Service. Witnessing the exceptional care that lan's brother Alex received at West Park after becoming seriously injured in a snowmobile accident three years ago, the Troops were inspired to help future MSK patients.

The activity room will allow for customized recreation therapy to help patients regain fine motor skills, while the dining room will help patients connect with each other, and with family and friends, during a long hospital stay.

Kiwanis Club Donates \$25,000 to the Get Your Life Back Campaign



On February 4th, members of the West Park community celebrated a generous \$25,000 gift to the **Get Your Life Back Campaign** from the Kiwanis Club of Kingsway Humber to create a children's play area in the new hospital.
